Celebrating St. James the Apostle

Join us Sunday, July 23 at 4:00 PM

Though St. James’s Day is officially on July 25, you’re invited to join us next Sunday in Draesel Hall for *merienda*, or afternoon snack or tea, celebrating the Apostle with Spanish food and drinks, pictures, and stories from my recent walk on the Way of St. James, or Camino de Santiago.

Tradition says that after Jesus’s death and resurrection, James preached the Gospel in Hispania (the Iberian Peninsula which became Spain). When he returned to Palestine in 44 AD, he was killed by King Herod Agrippa. His disciples then claimed his body and sent it back to Iberia for burial. There are several different accounts of what happened next, but the remains seem to have reached Iberia and were hidden for safety.

In the 9th century, a hermit named Pelayo was praying and saw a bright light shining down from the sky. Intrigued by the light, he followed its path until he arrived at a field, where he (re)discovered the remains of St. James.

Today, the relics of St. James are in the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela. *Santiago* comes from the Latin name *Jacobus* which translates to “James” in English. *De Compostela* comes from the Latin term *Campus Stellae*, meaning “Field of Stars,” referring to the vision of Palayo. From the 9th century, and for many different reasons, pilgrims have made their Way of St. James. Come and hear more on Sunday, July 23.



The Second Lesson from Scripture

Romans 8: 1-11

Lector A reading from the Letter of Paul to the Romans.

There is no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus has set you free from the law of sin and of death. For God has done what the law, weakened by the flesh, could not do: by sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh, and to deal with sin, he condemned sin in the flesh, so that the just requirement of the law might be fulfilled in us, who walk not according to the flesh but according to the Spirit. For those who live according to the flesh set their minds on the things of the flesh, but those who live according to the Spirit set their minds on the things of the Spirit. To set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. For this reason the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law--indeed it cannot, and those who are in the flesh cannot please God. But you are not in the flesh; you are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. But if Christ is in you, though the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you.

Matthew 13:1-9, 18-23

Minister The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

Jesus went out of the house and sat beside the sea. Such great crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat there, while the whole crowd stood on the beach. And he told them many things in parables, saying: "Listen! A sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seeds fell on the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. But when the sun rose, they were scorched; and since they had no root, they withered away. Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. Let anyone with ears listen!" "Hear then the parable of the sower. When anyone hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what is sown in the heart; this is what was sown on the path. As for what was sown on rocky ground, this is the one who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy; yet such a person has no root, but endures only for a while, and when trouble or persecution arises on account of the word, that person immediately falls away. As for what was sown among thorns, this is the one who hears the word, but the cares of the world and the lure of wealth choke the word, and it yields nothing. But as for what was sown on good soil, this is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields, in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty."

The Nicene Creed

Those who are able are invited to stand as we affirm the faith of the Church.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.







Music notes...

The closing voluntary, *Prelude and Fugue in B flat Major*, is from a set of eight preludes and fugues, a collection of organ works for keyboard and pedal which were thought to have been written by Johann Sebastian Bach. After the scientific examination of extant manuscripts by Alfred Dürr (a German Musicologist) in 1987, and further analysis of the compositional style by Peter Williams (a leading Bach scholar) it is thought that these Eight Preludes and Fugues were composed by Johann Ludwig Krebs (1713-1780), a student of J.S. Bach. According to Peter Williams, the *Prelude* reflects the writing style of popular oboe concertos of the 1730's and the fugue, which was most likely composed after 1740 was influenced by G. F. Handel's *Concerti grossi: 12 Grand Concertos* for two violins, cello, harpsichord continuo and string orchestra.

HOW TO JOIN US MORE FULLY

“I’m already an Episcopalian.”

Simply contact our parish office, give Erlinda Brent, the parish secretary, (ebrent@holytrinity-nyc.org) the name of your previous church, and we will do the rest.

“I was baptized, but not in an Episcopal Church.”

Simply obtain a letter from a former church or photocopy of your baptismal certificate. You can also be received or confirmed when the bishop visits Holy Trinity. Contact the rector or church office.
